



GRANTS PROGRAM 2007

Background:

The Victorian Women's Trust was established in 1985 in recognition of the role of women in shaping Victoria. In the time since, the Trust has positioned itself as one of Australia's foremost women's organisations. In the recently published book 'Creative Philanthropy' (2006), overseas authors Anheier and Leat selected the Trust as the only Australian example of nine organisations around the world as a case study of a creative foundation.

Fully independent, the Trust works to improve the status of, and conditions for, women in Victoria in whatever practical ways it can. It uses an annual funding program to invest in women and effect social change; forms strategic alliances; undertakes significant action projects; advocates on relevant issues; fosters networks for the exchange of skills, ideas and information; showcases women's talents; and encourages women from diverse backgrounds to participate in social and cultural events, discussion and debate. The Women's Trust survives and flourishes through its generous supporters and members.

The Victorian Women's Trust is inspired by the vision of a just and humane society in which women enjoy full participation as citizens. We believe that by creating a better world for women, we create a better world for men, children, families and communities.

GRANTS PROGRAM DIRECTION 2007:

The Trust's Grants Program supports women in powerful and direct ways and is central to improving the status of women in Victoria. Funded projects focus on activities that seek to address discrimination and disadvantage faced by women living in Victoria.

In 2007, our main areas of concern include:

- the continued threat of violence and harassment experienced by women
- the difficulties women face in the workplace (including work and family balance)
- the systematic devaluing of women's unpaid work
- the under-representation of women in decision making processes
- the number of women marginalised by poverty

In seeking to improve conditions for women living in Victoria, we especially welcome applications for projects addressing issues faced by Koori women, migrant and refugee women. We also welcome project proposals from regional Victoria.

The Trust has particular interest in supporting innovative projects that initiate and influence socially just change, leading to reforms in government policy, business practice and the wider community. We seek projects that instigate long-term positive change beyond the funding period. Proposals that demonstrate realistic budgets and sustainable funding support mechanisms

are given extra weight in the assessment process. We are also particularly interested in funding projects that propose new approaches to addressing issues faced by women. Successfully funded projects in the past have sought to achieve maximum impact and beneficial change on the lives of women they address.

By way of example, past grants include:

- *When Love Hurts* – the Domestic Violence and Incest Resource Centre’s award-winning brochure targeted at young women providing information about respectful healthy relationships.
- *Just Cuts* – an investigation addressing discriminatory selling practices, particularly in the provision of hairdressing services which led to a parliamentary inquiry.
- *Wananga Kooneem Pa* – an educational pamphlet on sexual assault and local service providers addressing the problem for Koori women in Victoria’s south-west region.
- *A Directory of Women’s Tradespeople* – the first ever directory promoting the role of women in non-traditional areas of employment.
- *Blood on Whose Hands?* - the first book to document a history of domestic homicides in Victoria, completed over three Women’s Trust grants by the Women’s Coalition Against Family Violence.
- *Women’s Human Rights Advocacy Program* – run through the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre, this project has provided many female asylum seekers living in Victoria with legal assistance, as well as advocating for wider policy reform.
- *Getting the Balance Right* – a booklet developed by WIRE on how to create family friendly workplaces for women in small non-government organisations.

Please Note - Final decisions about projects are made by the Board of Trustees by mid-year.

ELIGIBILITY AND EXCLUSIONS:

- 1. The Trust does not fund individuals.**
- 2. The Trust can only make grants to charitable funds, authorities and institutions that have been endorsed by the Australian Tax Office (ATO) as Deductible Gift Recipients (DGR status – i.e. to which gifts of \$2 or more are deductible to the donor). To be eligible for a Women’s Trust grant, organisations must have both ITEC (Income Tax Exempt Charity) and DGR (Deductible Gift Recipient) status.**

All eligible applicants are required to supply a photocopy of two letters from the ATO endorsing the applicant as (1) a Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) and (2) an Income Tax Exempt Charity (ITEC)

3. Eligibility is strictly limited to groups “*which operate for charitable purposes and either provide relief of poverty, sickness, suffering, distress, misfortune, destitution or helplessness amongst Victorian women or operate for the purposes beneficial to Victorian women*”.
4. The Trust does not provide matching or shortfall funding for government funded projects.

5. The Trust does not fund private consultants, however, an organisation may choose to hire consultants with grant funds.
6. The Trust does not normally fund projects covering infrastructure or operational costs.
7. Projects must address the needs of women living in Victoria.
8. Applications must address the questions outlined in the Granting Guidelines.
9. The Trust looks favourably at applications that initiate socially just change and lead to wider reforms in the community.
10. The Trust is open to the possibility of funding the project of an eligible organisation in collaboration with another organisation.
11. Grants are generally made for one year. The Trust is aware, however, that some proposed projects may not fall within this timeframe. In this case, the Trust may consider funding projects for more than one year.

EVALUATION OF SUCCESSFUL GRANTS:

Effective evaluation benefits all parties: the Trust by better informing its future granting decisions; the grantee by clarifying the link between objectives and outcomes; the wider community through exposure to the knowledge and experience gained as a result of the project. Successful grantees are expected to:

- Discuss their project with a representative from the Victorian Women's Trust
- Provide a comprehensive report on the results of their project
- Complete a financial acquittal
- Accommodate site visits when requested
- Attribute any promotional material resulting from the grant with acknowledgement of the Victorian Women's Trust
- Work closely with the Trust where appropriate by exploring possible policy implications of the project

HOW TO APPLY:

Interested applicants must lodge submissions no later than MONDAY MARCH 5, 2007. Applications must address the questions outlined in the granting guidelines.

Email applications are preferred, and can be sent to women@vwt.org.au by the due date. Should this not be possible, applicants can lodge two hardcopies (one photocopy) of their application, postmarked with the due date.

In order to be eligible to receive a grant, applicants must supply a photocopy of two letters from the Australian Tax Office endorsing the applicant as (1) a deductible gift recipient and (2) an Income Tax Exempt Charity. When answering the below questions, write in as much space as you require, but no more than six pages in total.

- 1. Provide a brief sentence that conveys the essence of your project:**
- 2. What are the project's aims?**
- 3. Why is there a need for your project?**
- 4. Who will benefit and how?**
- 5. What are the aims and objectives of your organisation?**
- 6. Why is your organisation best placed to address this need?**
- 7. How is your project consistent with the vision and work of the Victorian Women's Trust?**

8. How does your project build on the existing work to date on the issue your project is addressing?
 9. What, at this stage, would you see as the full range of outcomes (immediate and longer term)?
 10. Provide a detailed implementation strategy outlining how your organisation will undertake the project (including who will be overseeing your project, project personnel, timelines, breakdown of stages etc):
 11. What is the total amount required for the project?
 12. What is the amount requested from the Victorian Women's Trust?
 13. Provide a detailed budget breakdown for the project, including:
 - all sources of income (of the project), all items of expenditure, an indication of the items for which Women's Trust support is sought, an indication of the items which will be provided by in-kind and other cash supports, an allowance for GST (Please Note - The Victorian Women's Trust, along with other members of Philanthropy Australia, has obtained a ruling from the Australian Taxation Office that it is not necessary to add GST to its grants. While GST must be factored into standard budget items, for example telephone costs and stationery, a remittance of ten per cent of the grant amount to the ATO is not required).
 14. How will the project be evaluated?
 15. How might the project be influential (eg. initiate change, have an effect on government policy, business practice, the wider community)?
 16. What is the process for informing the wider community of issues with which the project is concerned?
 17. Are there other organisations considered as possible partners in a joint venture for this project? (If so, please outline):

Please note, any additional information supplied (eg. annual reports) will not be considered at this stage in the assessment process, and therefore should not be included with applications.
