Fearless Beatrice Faust Book Launch

On Wednesday 30 April, over 200 people gathered at the Wheeler Centre in Melbourne to launch Judith Brett's feminist biography, Fearless Beatrice Faust: Sex, Feminism and Body Politics, published by Text Publishing.

Judith spoke with broadcaster and writer, Sally Warhaft, about who Bea Faust was in both the personal and the public, what we can learn from her, and what she might have thought of feminism as it stands today. It was a bold, unflinching conversation about a truly fearless feminist.

In addition to the central conversation, Sally White spoke of her time working alongside Bea Faust as they founded the Women's Electoral Lobby in the 1970s.


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Vale Geraldine Rimmer-Robertson

Born in 1942, Geraldine Rimmer-Robertson was a devoted feminist who passed away in June 2025.

Before Geraldine died, Mary Crooks AO (former VWT Executive Director) encouraged her to document what it was like to grow up in Melbourne during a time of immense social upheaval, and to share her reflections of the women's liberation movement in the 1970s.

Rising to the challenge, Geraldine penned a series of candid snapshots from her life. Witty and often very funny, *Vignettes of a Feminist* was published by the Victorian Women's Trust in a limited run for her friends and family. In this unique collection, Geraldine offers keen observations of a changing society and women who dared to defy expectation.

Maternity Care in Australia: Is the system working?

In a healthcare system that has been shaped by medical misogyny, women are frequently characterised as incapable and entirely dependent on medical professionals. Quality maternity care safeguards the physical and mental wellbeing of mothers and their babies; positively shapes the maternal bond between the mother and child; and fosters a sense of agency for new parents.



The national strategy 'Women-centred care: Strategic directions for Australia's maternity services', released in November 2019, outlined the future of Australia's maternity services. Since its release, notable publications such as the Australian Birth Experience Study, the NSW Birth Trauma Inquiry, and Deakin University's national survey on maternity care experiences have questioned the effectiveness of the strategy.

Each publication emphasised the need for informed consent, better education, continuity of care, and better support systems, indicating that Australian maternity services *did not excel in any aspect* of the national strategy.

These publications, along with direct concerns raised with the Victorian Women's Trust, compelled us to create a space for women across Victoria to share their own maternity care experiences.

In 2024, we conducted a survey to better understand the current state of the sector.

The responses reveal a collective story of a system that, despite the dedication of many healthcare professionals, has left too many women feeling disempowered, disrespected, and unsupported.

Walk for Truth

On June 18th, VWT was proud to join the final leg of the Walk for Truth, the 500km walk from Portland to Parliament to mark the closure of Australia's first formal truth-telling process, the Yoorrook Justice Commission.

Naarm generously brought out the sunshine for us as we huddled in beanies and scarves with a few thousand others at Kings Domain for ceremony, speeches and dances. In a public display of support for Treaty, the crowd walked together through the city to the steps of Parliament House.
